This year has been a whirlwind, guite literally at times, as we spent about 10 weeks doing disaster relief from tornadoes and hurricanes. We even had a whirlwind that took down the storage building that housed all of our equipment. Through these trials and storms. we still see God's faithfulness and are confident of His goodness. While a lot of our equipment was damaged, we should be able to repair, rebuild, and replace what we need to.

As we start our 17th year of ministry, I am amazed at how far God has brought us and look forward to what is ahead. We are excited for what the future holds. We are establishing a more regular schedule to make it easier for local volunteers to get involved. We are seeking to build or buy a warehouse to meet our short-term and longterm plans. We already have a full schedule of mission teams for next summer. We can see that the "harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few" and we are seeking ways to get more people involved, knowing that will give us more opportunities to minister to the hurting all around us. Disaster Relief – All Year Long

This year the disasters got off to a quick start and never really let up. On January 13 tornadoes tore across central Georgia and we headed to LaGrange, GA and then over the next 6 weeks we moved east to Mansfield and then to Locust Grove.

In March, another round of tornadoes hit and we headed to Hartselle, AL for a few davs.

The end of April found us in Adamsville, TN for yet another round of tornado cleanup.

Even at home, we had severe storms throughout the summer and cleaned up broken trees in Dalton, Rome, and Woodstock.



Late in the summer Hurricane Idalia caught much of south Georgia by surprise. They were expecting some rain and maybe a little wind, but nothing like the onslaught of 90 mph winds and flooding that came ashore on August 30.

That afternoon we were on a conference call with the state VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters) and heard the mayor of Valdosta say that more than 1000 trees were down on the roads. We packed up and headed to Valdosta and were on the ground less than 24 hours after Idalia left her mark.

We partnered with a couple of churches -Redeemer Presbyterian Church and Perimeter Road Baptist Church. These churches let us set up in their parking lots and they fed us lots of tasty food, provided volunteers, and helped with logistics. We love to see the local church respond and help their communities. Our ministry is so much better when the local church is involved. We had a good turn-out of volunteers from Dalton who made the 5hour trip down south.

CAL IMPACT

We had a productive summer with a full schedule of mission teams. Making bathrooms and houses handicap accessible seemed to be the majority of our projects this summer. Thankfully, we had over 160 volunteers work with us in Dalton this year and it was one of our best years ever!

Typically, making a bathroom handicap accessible means taking out an old tub and installing a shower. This usually involves tearing out the floor and often modifying the walls as well.

We have completed many projects and shared the love of Jesus through these physical expressions, but the needs continue to outpace our ability to meet them. We want to help as many hurting people as possible because their needs are very real. To make this happen we need more volunteers getting involved and sharing the excitement about helping others. Sometimes a homeowner just needs someone to sit and talk and pray with them to have a life-changing impact.

Our Own Disaster and Recovery


Storage Building Collapse

After returning from Valdosta in September, we parked our equipment in our pole barn storage shelter and took a couple of days off to recover. Before we even got back to unload the trucks and trailers, the wind knocked down the building on top of all of our equipment. This was especially challenging as all of our equipment that we needed to clean up and start the recovery process was trapped and/or damaged. It was a feeling of helplessness; one that we often see in disasters when we show up to help. Instead of being the ones to offer help, we were on the receiving end of it. We are grateful for our local volunteers who stepped in and were able to deconstruct the building and carefully extract each piece of equipment bit by bit.

Thankfully, insurance is covering the cost of replacing the building and repairing the equipment. Mostly what we are losing is time. This is a slow process of getting estimates and scheduling repairs and waiting on materials. We are hoping to have this rebuilt by the first of the year.

The Bible is full of stories of people who have lost much and been restored to do even greater things. I think of Job who lost his business, his family, and his health yet still trusted God and was restored 10-fold. Even more amazing though, we see the cross of Jesus that seemed to signify that death and hell had won, but Sunday came and the tomb was empty! What seemed like a loss became the greatest victory because God is in the restoration business. He redeems us, makes order out of our chaos, and makes broken things beautiful. We have complete confidence that this trial will result in God's glory and improve our abilities to help others. Through it all, it's helped us empathize a little better with those we help after a disaster.

It's a good reminder that any of us are just a gust of wind from having our possessions and lives turned upside down.
